## **Course Descriptions**

## PAC 2505 - Introduction to Pastoral Care and Counseling

This course is designed to equip persons for effective basic pastoral care and counseling in a church, hospital, or community context. Basic theories and practices of pastoral care and counseling will be evaluated in relation to developmental and crisis situations. Students will integrate Biblical, theological, cultural, and psychological understandings of the human condition as foundational for care and counseling practices.

THE 2707 – Trauma, Theology, and Pastoral Practice (prereq. Invitation to Christian Theology) Trauma causes heightened anxiety, intense distress, numbing pain, profound suffering, deep depression, cognitive dissonance, relational fracturing, and unspeakable loss and grief. Drawing on pastoral care and theological resources, this interdisciplinary course addresses personal, family, faith, social, and cultural trauma. Attention will be given to how persons, churches, and communities can mobilize resources of intelligence, faith, and imagination by responding to trauma in healing, sustaining, guiding, and restorative practices.
